*SL-8-1011	Color on 400 ft. reel	22.0 min.	<b>"The Briegleb BG-12A Sailplane."</b> An amateur film showing some construction and assembly details of this new design of plywood covered sailplane available in kit form from the SEAIR Company. Film includes scenes of this sailplane in flight.	\$2.00

SL-16-1001	B&W on 400 ft. reel	12.0 min.	<b>"Frank Hawks' Transcontinental Glider Tow, 1930; and First National Soaring Contest, Elmira, 1930."</b> Shows Hawks' take-off in Franklin glider from San Diego and being welcomed in New York by Grover Whalen. Shows first national meet at South Mountain take-off site near Elmira, with early glider pioneers such as R. E. Franklin, Gus Haller, Jack O'Meara, Wolf Hirth, Al Hastings (first national champion), formation flying, etc.	\$2.50
SL-16-1002	B&W on 400 ft. reel	9.9 min.	<b>"Second National Soaring Contest, Elmira, N.Y., 1931."</b> Shows launchings at South Mountain and East Ridge, and landings at Caton Avenue Airport in South Elmira, and scenes with Hawley Bowlus, Al Hastings, Bud Iszard, Bill Purcell, Warren Eaton, R. A. Barnaby, Martin Schempp, Percy Pierce, R. E. Franklin with his special closed cockpit extra span glider, etc.	\$2.50
SL-16-1003	B&W on 800 ft. reel	19.4 min.	<b>"Flying With The Toledo Gliding Club, 1933-35."</b> Shows activities of this Club during these early days of gliding near and at the shores of Lake Erie, and the search for gliding sites. Filmed by E. F. Knight.	\$3.50
SL-16-1004	B&W on 800 ft. reel	21.0 min.	<b>"Plane Sailing."</b> Filmed by Philip Wills of Great Britain about 1937. Shows early British contests and various designs of sailplanes of that era. (Filmed originally for sound but printed with titles for use as a silent film. Should be projected at sound speed).	\$4.00

SL-16-1007	B&W on 400 ft. reel	17.1 min.	<b>"The National Glider Meet, Sept. 21 to Oct. 5, 1930, Elmira, N.Y."</b> This film was made by Warren E. Eaton, an outstanding proponent of gliding as a sport and for youth training in aviation. It begins with the first National Contest held near Elmira, N.Y., and follows with gliding scenes during the early 1930's. The film is presented as originally edited by Warren Eaton.	\$2.50
SL-16-1008	B&W on 3 400 ft. reels	34.0 min.	<b>"Soaring—A Story of Motorless Flight."</b> A film depicting gliding and soaring activities at sites where this sport was popular during the early 1930's. Film is concerned primarily with student training in Germany at the Hornberg gliding school, with Wolf Hirth demonstrating techniques and flight maneuvers. Various types of gliders and methods of launching are shown. Gliding club activities in Switzerland are shown both in summer and in winter. Activities at Ellenville and Elmira, N.Y., are also included.	\$4.50
SL-16-1009	B&W on 400 ft. reel	16.8 min.	<b>"Principles Of Flight."</b> A basic instructional film on aerodynamics for classroom work beginning with gliders in flight and showing, through animated diagrams, why gliders can be controlled in flight. *SL-16-1010	B&W on 400 ft. reel	12.0 min.	<b>"Flying at Cape Cod, 1929."</b> Scenes taken at American Motorless Aviation Corp. school at South Wellfleet, Cape Cod, Mass., in August, 1929. Shows German-built gliders used at school being flown off sand dunes and shows R. S. Barnaby making his qualifying flight for the first United States "C" certificate.	\$2.00
